Formed in 2013, the Ohio Service Industry Coalition includes businesses, trade associations, and professional organizations in industries having a profound impact on the daily economic lives of Ohioans.

In 2016, the industries represented by Coalition members collectively had approximately 1 million employees at an estimated 60,000 establishments with a total compensation of nearly \$40 billion.

Members of our coalition strongly agree with legislative leaders who have expressed opposition to elements of tax shifting in HB 49, the state biennial budget bill, as introduced.

Reducing and simplifying Ohio’s state income tax is a worthy goal, but we oppose raising the state sales tax rate and extending state and local sales taxes to services not already taxed under Ohio law. Higher sales tax rates and new taxes on targeted services will slow sales, hurt the state’s competitiveness, and raise costs for individual and business consumers.

Only three states have a broad sales/gross receipts tax base that includes many professional services – Hawaii, New Mexico, and South Dakota. None of Ohio’s bordering states impose a sales tax on professional services. Of the four additional states that have enacted a sales tax on professional services, *all four quickly repealed the law* before or soon after it went into effect.

Our coalition is grateful to the General Assembly for resisting similar proposals in recent budget cycles. We urge legislators to do so again in the best interests of Ohio’s businesses, consumers and overall economy.

We stand ready to support the General Assembly in efforts to provide income tax relief without imposing new and higher taxes on Ohio’s job creators.
